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# Tips For A Safe, Happy Halloween

### 1. Keep Candy and Wrappers Away

While candy might taste great, it's full of ingredients your pup can't have. Not only do they need to avoid all the different candy options out there, but with candy wrappers laying around you need to be careful about them too. The wrappers present a choking hazard and are not good for your dog. Keeping candy and wrappers away from your dog inside your home can be easy but keeping them away from dropped candy and wrappers on your next walk can be a bit more challenging.

# 2. Never Leave a Dressed-Up Pet Alone

Before getting too carried away with costumes, make sure your dog is comfortable wearing clothing or stuff like that. While your pet might look cute in their costume, they can get caught up on them. Not only that, but if your pet starts chewing on their costume it can quickly become a choking hazard. There's nothing wrong with dressing up your pet, but make sure you supervise them when they're in their costume. Whenever you have to, step away or leave the house go ahead and take them out of the outfit so they can stay happy and safe.

### 3. Give Them a Quiet Place

If your dog doesn't do well with lots of noise and movement, give them a place where they can get away from everything. This is especially true during trick-or-treating times, as all the new people can really rile up your dog. Finally, since everyone tends to dress up on Halloween, it can stir up your dog even more since no one looks the same.

### 4. Be Careful with Decorations

From Jack-o-lanterns to Halloween lights, there are a ton of potential decorations you can put up. But with a dog, you need to be a little bit more careful. Dogs love to chew on different things, so keep this in mind when you're putting up your Halloween décor.

Don't put things up that will entice your pup into chewing on it, and don't put anything out that will seriously hurt your dog if they do decide to chew a bit.

# 5. Keep Glow Sticks Away

Glow sticks and bracelets are a great way to add a little more visibility to children who are trick-or-treating. But while they do a great job of making them visible, they look just like a toy to a dog.

The problem is that the fluorescent material inside these glow sticks or bracelets can be toxic if your dog ingests them. Do yourself and your dog a favor and keep them away from the glowsticks.

# 6. Keep the Door Shut

When it's trick-or-treating time, it's easy to just leave the door open while you hand out candy. But with dogs, this creates an easy opening for them to slip outside when no one is looking. Either shut the door between trick-or-treaters or step outside and shut the door behind you.

It might be a little more work, but it'll keep your dog from slipping out and it'll keep any trick-or-treaters from accidentally scaring your dog.

# 7. Use an ID Tag and Microchip

This is great advice for every day, and it's great advice for Halloween too. If your dog does happen to slip away through an open door or because a costume freaked them out, an ID tag and a microchip help whoever finds them to get them back home. Neither ID tags nor microchips cost much, and it makes a big difference if your dog does get out. Get an ID tag and put it on your dog sooner rather than later.

# 8. Get a Properly Fitting Costume

Your dog looks super cute when you put them in a Halloween costume, but if their costume fits them a little tighter than it did last year or if you're looking to get a costume they can grow into, think twice about putting them in it. A costume that fits them right is far less likely for them to get caught up in, and it looks better too!

### Conclusion

Dogs and Halloween don't always go hand-in-hand, but now that you know how to keep them safe during the holiday, you can enjoy the day without worrying about your dog. Just don't take their safety for granted because all it takes is one mistake for something to happen.

# ANSWERS Pet Food Voluntarily Withdrawals Certain Limited Lots of Beef and Chicken Dog Foods Due to Potential Salmonella and Listeria

Lystn, LLC d.b.a./ANSWERS Pet Food of Fleetwood, PA, is voluntarily withdrawing certain lots of ANSWERS Detailed Beef Formula for Dogs, ANSWERS Straight Beef Formula for Dogs, and ANSWERS Straight Chicken Formula for Dogs out of an abundance of caution after samples collected by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration were reported to have tested positive for the presence of Salmonella and Listeria monocytogenes. No illnesses associated with these lots have been confirmed. Salmonella and Listeria monocytogenes can affect animals eating the products and there is risk to humans from handling contaminated pet products, especially if they have not thoroughly washed their hands after contact with the products or any surfaces exposed to these products.

Listeria monocytogenes rarely causes illness in dogs, but it is possible. Dogs can have mild symptoms such as diarrhea and vomiting. Even if a dog is not showing symptoms, it can still be a carrier of the bacteria and spread it to humans. If a dog has consumed a product lot identified below, pet parents are encouraged to consult their veterinarian if symptoms exist.

People can become sick by handling contaminated food or touching surfaces that have been exposed to Listeria monocytogenes. Symptoms in humans may include fever, headache, muscle aches, stiff neck, nausea, abdominal pain, diarrhea, confusion, loss of balance and convulsions. Young children, elderly people, pregnant women, and those with weakened immune systems are particularly vulnerable to Listeria monocytogenes infections and symptoms can be more severe. Anyone exhibiting symptoms after handling a product lot identified below, should contact their healthcare provider.

Individuals handling pet food can become infected with Salmonella, especially if they have not thoroughly washed their hands after having contact with surfaces exposed to such a lot of product being implicated. There are thousands of species of Salmonella, less than a handful are harmful to pets or humans. Healthy people infected with Salmonella should monitor themselves for some or all the following symptoms: nausea, vomiting, diarrhea or bloody diarrhea, abdominal cramping, and fever. Rarely, Salmonella can result in more serious ailments, including arterial infections, endocarditis, arthritis, muscle pain, eye irritation, and urinary tract symptoms. Consumers exhibiting these signs after having contact with such a product should contact their healthcare providers. Children, the elderly, and individuals with compromised immune systems may be at greater risk of Salmonella infection.

Pets with Salmonella infections may be lethargic and have diarrhea or bloody diarrhea, fever, and vomiting. Some pets may only exhibit decreased appetite, fever, and abdominal pain. Infected but otherwise healthy pets can be carriers and infect other animals or humans. If your pet has consumed the product lot identified below and has these symptoms, please contact your veterinarian.

The lots referenced below were distributed throughout the United States in retail stores and direct online sales. Again, no illnesses associated with these lots have been confirmed.

ANSWERS is notifying the public, distributors, and retail stores regarding this notice.

The products being withdrawn are sold in 4lb half gallon cartons (see pictures at end of this announcement). The brand names and lot numbers of the product being withdrawn are listed in the table below:

# What to Do

FDA guidelines recommend any product from the listed lots that has not yet been consumed should be thrown out or destroyed in a way that children, pets, and wildlife cannot access it. Areas that may have come in contact with any contaminated food should be sanitized. The FDA recommends that people do not touch potentially contaminated food with bare hands and therefore suggests wearing gloves or using paper towels when placing any contaminated product in a sealed bag to throw out or when handling such food.

If consumers have any of these lots of products in their possession and desire a refund, please submit a receipt and pictures of the product to info@answerspetfood.com along with the retailer's information. If you have questions or concerns, please email ANSWERS' Pet Food at info@answerspetfood.com.

### For Informational Purpose

From time-to-time pathogens appear in all types of pet food products and some may be harmful to pets and/or humans. The FDA considers any presence (zero tolerance) of Salmonella and Listeria monocytogenes, regardless of origin, quantity, and type, as an adulterant in pet food. In accordance with the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, to date, ANSWERS has not received any quantification data or a completed Health Hazard Evaluation (HHE) from the FDA or Center for Veterinarian Medicine for these particular lots of products. ANSWERS is conducting this voluntary withdrawal of these particular lots out of an abundance of caution to protect public health by ensuring timely removal of the implicated product lots from the marketplace. ANSWERS will continue investigating this FDA report pursuing its number one priority to bring healthy, safe, truly raw pet food products to market.

ANSWERS has been and will continue to work with the FDA to ensure that the highest and safest food is provided to your pets and continues to stand by the safety of our food and the unique and innovative way we protect our food with fermentation, probiotics and protective cultures that mitigate pathogens from growing.



# Celebrate The Special Moments And Events In Your Dog's Life With... CAKE!

This month's recipe is number seven of nine veterinarian approved cake recipes I am sharing with you. So there's no excuse that you can't celebrate your dog's birthday, adoption day or any other special occasion. So get ready to bake...

These recipes all use dog-friendly ingredients, but keep in mind that your dog could have food sensitivities or different dietary needs. Talk to your veterinarian if you're not sure which recipe will work best for you and your dog!

It is important to know that these cakes are only for special occasions and should be served to your dog in small amounts, as a very special treat. Your dog's main diet should be based on animal-derived proteins, healthy fats, and a low amount of healthy carbohydrates. But yes, also, your doggy deserves to celebrate and have a treat!

Please when choosing the ingredients, make sure you choose them without artificial sweeteners, such as Xylitol (which is sometimes called Birch Sugar) as they can be very toxic for dogs. Now... Let's Bake!





If your pup is inviting a few friends over to celebrate, why not make a batch of pup cakes? This easy dog-friendly recipe even has a potato- and yogurt-based frosting!

Pupcakes piled high with dog friendly frosting to celebrate your dog's birthday! Easy dog cupcakes made with banana and peanut butter – the smell drives them crazy! The crowning glory is fluffy frosting made with no butter, no cream cheese, sugar free. Aren't you dying to know the secret??

• NOTE: This recipe calls for peanut butter, make sure it is Xylitol (or Birch Sugar) free!!!

Prep Time: 15 minutes Bake Time: 40 minutes Additional Time: 10 minutes

### PUPCAKE INGREDIENTS

- 2 ripe bananas (150g/5oz after peeling, ~2/3 cup mashed)
- 1/2 cup peanut butter, smooth or creamy (Note 1)
- 1/3 cup honey
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups flour , all purpose/plain OR wholewheat/wholemeal (Note 2)
- 2 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 cup oil, vegetable, canola, peanut or olive oil
- 3/4 cup water

# INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F (160°C fan). Line a 12 hole muffin tin with cupcake liners.
- 2. Place bananas in a bowl and mash with a potato masher until smooth as you can get it.
- 3. Add peanut butter, honey and eggs. Whisk well until smooth.
- 4. Add flour, baking powder, oil and water. Whisk until smooth.
- 5. Divide between cupcakes until 3/4 full. Bake for 22 minutes until the top is golden, or the skewer comes out clean.
- 6. Transfer to cooling rack and cool for 30 minutes before topping with "frosting"

### Frosting

- 1. Place the potato in a large pot of water. Bring to boil, then cook potato for 20 minutes until very, very soft and starting to crumble on the edges.
- 2. Drain, then return to the empty pot. Add yogurt, honey and water (starting with 2 tbsp). Beat with an electric beater for 1 minute on speed 3, increasing to speed 5, for 1 minute or until smooth and creamy. Add more water if needed it should have a soft consistency like frosting.
- 3. Transfer to a piping bag fitted with a 1.5cm / 3/5" round nozzle (Note 3 for other nozzles). Pipe in swirling motion onto cupcakes, top with dog biscuit.

### FROSTING

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 500g / 1lb potatoes , peeled and cut into 2 cm/1" pieces
- 2 tbsp honey
- 1/2 cup yogurt, plain low fat (any unsweetened type) OR sour cream
- 2 4 tbsp water
- 12 small dog bone biscuits, for decorating (optional)



# **NATIONAL FIRE PUP DAY - OCTOBER 1, 2024**

National Fire Pup Day on October 1st recognizes the canine firefighters that have long been members of fire departments across the country.

While the Dalmatian's origin is unknown, their use in firehouses began during the 1700s. Trained as a carriage dog, the Dalmatian's agility transferred quickly to horse-drawn fire engines. Even though Dalmatians weren't the only dogs fit for carriage work, they were the ones who mostly filled the role of fire dogs. They were also easily identified by their spotted and speckled coats.

In the days of the horse-drawn fire carts, they provided a valuable service, having a natural affinity to horses. The Dalmatian's duty was to run alongside the horses. They ran in front of or beneath the wagon axles clearing the way.

Long after the red engines replaced horse-drawn wagons, the Dalmatian remains a recognizable tradition in fire stations across the country. These energetic firehouse mascots serve to educate the public about fire safety. They also represent past fire pups in honor of their heroism.

# NATIONAL MAKE A DOG'S DAY - OCTOBER 22, 2024

- Adopting a dog who has received excellent care in the shelter, which means they are healthy.

### If A Dog Could Talk

Adoption is just one way to make a dog's day. If your favorite canine companion could talk, they might tell us going for an extra-long walk would make their day. When was the last time you visited the dog park? Of course, a new chew toy might top their list. Sometimes, they just want to play. Throw the ball already! Another thing that tops the list of fur babies everywhere - don't stop scratching that itch.

# Trainer Tips "Helping Your Dog Refocus With The Up & Down Game"

2004-2024 The Light of Dog

Helping our dogs to return focus to us can be done in many different ways. One of those is the Up and Down Pattern Game from Leslie McDevitt.

My number one request might very well be helping dogs to listen when "distractions" are present. That might pretty much cover just about everything I do as a dog trainer!

Helping our dogs learn how to focus on us, or to refocus on us after a distraction, is something I spend a lot of time helping clients do. It happens in just about all situations. Is your dog struggling with leash manners? Distractions! Is your dog worried about strangers? Distractions! Is your dog not coming reliably when you call? Distractions!

The goal is NOT to keep our dogs focused on us all the time and never notice distractions. That's not realistic nor advisable. We want our dog to notice distractions, but sometimes not get quite so caught up in them! Notice but not engage.

Leslie McDevitt's Up and Down Pattern Game is just one way to help teach our dogs how to return focus to us. She discussed this game in her book Control Unleashed Reactive to Relaxed.

We work on this exercise in some of my classes, especially my Juvenile Delinquents Class. I also teach it to many of my students in private training.

Here's how it works. You can be sitting or standing. Your dog can be sitting or standing. Place a treat on the ground in front of your dog. Once he eats it, hopefully he looks back up at you in hopes of getting another treat. When he looks back up at you, reward with another treat on the ground. If you are using a clicker or marker, mark when he looks back up at you before you reward.

Sometimes your dog will not look back up at you right away. That's ok. If he notices a distraction in the environment, it's ok if he looks at it. Hopefully, he will then turn away and look back at you. Reward with another treat on the ground. The goal is for him to notice distractions and be able to look back at you without you having to prompt him. He notices the distraction and makes the choice to look back at you.

Depending on the distraction, some dogs will need longer to watch and process it before turning back to you. Give him as long as he needs, as long as he's not trying to move toward the distraction, or bark at it, or otherwise engage with it.

If he does react, then you need to either move farther away from the distraction or reset and find a lesser distraction someplace else to work on this game first.

There are other variations that can be added in, depending on how difficult or easy this is for your dog. There are other pattern games that can be incorporated. But this is a good one to start with.

Try it out and let me know how it goes!
