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Should You Let Your Dog Sleep In Bed With You? The Age Old Question... And An Answer

Just like us, many dogs love the warm cozy embrace of our bed after a long day. But just because our dogs want to sleep in our beds, should we let them? Our beds not only offer our dogs a snug retreat, but also offer closeness to their human pack members - but it comes with a few potential problems as well. Ultimately, the decision should be what's best for you and your unique dog.

Why does my dog want to sleep in my bed?

Dogs often seek out their owner's bed for several reasons, all relating to their natural instincts and emotional needs.

The main reason is similar to why humans love to fall into bed after a long day: the comfort and security your bed provides. As one of the softest and most inviting spots in the house, it offers a sense of safety and warmth that appeals to them (just as it does humans), especially during colder nights.

Dogs are pack animals and have a strong instinct to bond with their pack members - that's you! Sleeping in your bed allows them to be close to you, strengthening this connection and showing affection. This proximity can also be soothing for dogs, as it reassures them that they are not alone.

Additionally, dogs often develop a habit or preference for sleeping in certain areas if they find them particularly relaxing or rewarding. If your dog has been allowed to sleep in your bed since they were a puppy, or if they have had positive experiences there, they might naturally prefer it over other sleeping areas.

Why does my dog sleep by my feet at the foot of the bed?

If you've noticed your dog likes to sleep at the foot of your bed, it's actually a pretty sweet gesture in several ways.

First, this spot can be the perfect balance for them: cozy enough to feel snug and secure, but not too confining. It allows them to stretch out a bit without feeling too distant from you. Overall, while sharing a bed with your dog is not for everyone, those who do often find it enhances their quality of life, providing comfort, warmth, and a deeper connection with their pet.

Problems when dogs share the bed:




By following these simple guidelines, you can enjoy the benefits of having your pet close while also getting restful sleep.

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

This means that they should be healthy and up to date on vaccines, parasite preventatives, and microchips. You'll also want to ensure you have all the pet travel essentials ready to go.

Checklist for traveling with dogs:

- Leash, collar, ID tags, and harness (if you use one)
- Food, water, treats, and medications (pack enough) for the duration of the trip, plus extra in case of delays)
- Travel bowls
- Dog travel crate and/or dog seat belt for the car
- Travel dog bed
- Poop bags
- Pet wipes

- Vaccine records and/or health certificate (if required)
- Pet insurance information
- Pet first aid kit and the number to Pet Poison Control
- Comfort items like your dog's favorite toy and/or blanket
- Calming aids like Adaptil
- Any activity-specific gear needed, e.g. a hands-free leash for hiking, a dog life jacket for swimming, etc.
- If your dog is known to wander off, consider a GPS tracking collar.

Finding pet-friendly destinations and accommodations

There are lots of pet-friendly vacation destinations across the country, from National Parks and campgrounds to all-inclusive luxury resorts and wellness retreats. But when traveling with pets, it's important to plan for the journey as much as the destination, especially when traveling by car. You can map out pet-friendly hotels, pet-friendly restaurants, and pet-friendly activities like parks, beaches, and hiking trails along the way with apps like Bring Fido.

While there's no shortage of dog-friendly hotels to choose from nowadays, if you're traveling with multiple dogs or your canine companion is on the larger side, be sure to check pet policies before booking. Some hotels limit one pet per room or have weight restrictions. They may also require proof of vaccines, so don't forget your pup's paperwork. For our feline friends, most pet-friendly hotels accept both cats and dogs, but there are always exceptions. Be sure to inquire if the pet-friendly status applies to cats.

If you're looking for more space or privacy for you and your pets, don't forget about vacation rentals. You can find pet-friendly vacation homes through sites like Airbnb and Vrbo. Some even have large, fenced-in yards for your dogs to play, on-site access to dog-friendly beaches and hiking trails, and other pet perks.

Keeping your pet safe while traveling

Vacations are all about having a good time, but safety also needs to be a top priority when exploring new places with your pet. Even the most docile dog or calm cat may be tempted to make a run for it to check out a new sight, sound, or smell. Always keep your dog leashed and your cat in a carrier when getting in and out of a car, hotel room, or walking through a public area like a rest stop or airport. And of course, ensure they always have ID tags on!

There are also hazards to look out for while traveling with your pet. Consider the weather, especially when hiking or spending time

outdoors with your pet, heatstroke can occur quickly in dogs, even if it doesn't feel that hot out to us humans. It's important to take proper safety precautions for pets in warm weather, which includes never leaving your pet in a parked car, even if you think you'll only be gone a few minutes.

High-traffic public areas can also be full of hazards for pets. From antifreeze and oil spills to fast-food scraps, chocolate, gum, and even chicken bones. Dogs have a knack for sniffing out food and garbage on walks, so keep a close eye on them while navigating rest stops, gas stations, and parking lots.



Celebrate The Special Moments And Events In Your Dog's Life With... CAKE!

This month's recipe is number seven of nine veterinarian approved cake recipes I am sharing with you. So there's no excuse that you can't celebrate your dog's birthday, adoption day or any other special occasion. So get ready to bake...

These recipes all use dog-friendly ingredients, but keep in mind that your dog could have food sensitivities or different dietary needs. Talk to your veterinarian if you're not sure which recipe will work best for you and your dog!

It is important to know that these cakes are only for special occasions and should be served to your dog in small amounts, as a very special treat. Your dog's main diet should be based on animal-derived proteins, healthy fats, and a low amount of healthy carbohydrates. But yes, also, your doggy deserves to celebrate and have a treat!

Please when choosing the ingredients, make sure you choose them without artificial sweeteners, such as Xylitol (which is sometimes called Birch Sugar) as they can be very toxic for dogs. Now... Let's Bake!





This straightforward dog cake recipe uses shredded carrots and an optional splash of honey. Even better, if you have a ring mold, you can make it crown-shaped!

This dog birthday cake is super fun to make. I made this for my dog, and she ate it all up. The honey is optional, but it makes the cake a sweeter treat for the dog. And yes, I tried some — it's pretty good.

This dog cake is packed full of great ingredients, including peanut butter, applesauce and pumpkin. It comes together and bakes up just like any other cake, but is perfect for your pets. The optional frosting is made from peanut butter and yogurt. This recipe calls for peanut butter, make sure it is Xylitol free!!!

Prep Time: 15 minutes Bake Time: 40 minutes Additional Time: 10 minutes

CAKE INGREDIENTS

- 1 egg
- 1/₃ cup honey (Optional)
- 1/4 cup peanut butter
- ½ cup cooking oil
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 1 cup whole wheat or white flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

INSTRUCTIONS

- Gather all ingredients. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 6-cup ring mold or fluted tube pan.
- Combine egg, honey, peanut butter, oil, and vanilla in a large bowl; blend well.
- Stir in carrots until well-combined.
- Sift together flour and baking soda and fold into carrot mixture.
- 5. Spoon cake batter into the prepared pan.
- Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, about 40 minutes.
- Let the cake cool in the pan for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- 8. Cut, serve and enjoy!



- Donate to a local fire rescue or police department's canine unit in your beloved pet's name. Your donation will help train animals for rescue and recovery.

Look for items or places that put your forever friend in danger. Place childproof locks on cabinets. Discard or repair any broken items. Our yards can be surprisingly risky, too. Check for toxic plants or holes in the fencing. Not only will your pup enjoy the companionship, but he will also be safer for all your exploring, too.

Spend a little extra time with your pups. Get down to their level. Make sure their environment and the places you take them are warm, comforting, inviting and safe. Oh yeah, and give your hounds some hugs! Use #NationalHugYourHoundDay to post on social media.

Trainer Tips "Putting 'Leave It' To The Test"

The other night (September 2010) I was watching TV while snuggled up on the couch with Romeo. Jahzara, the Greyhound, was sleeping on her dog bed nearby. Freighter, the cat, was somewhere nearby as well. Ed, my husband, had just gone to bed. All was quiet and peaceful.

Reminds me of the start of Twas the Night Before Christmas: "Twas the night before Christmas, when all through the house Not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse"

Suddenly, Freighter was chasing after something. I assumed it was a moth, as they often get in the house and Freighter can't resist chasing them. I didn't think much of it. Romeo, however, can't resist joining in the chase, so he leaps off the couch and goes flying over to Freighter and joins in the chase.

When I looked to see what they were chasing, I realized that it was much larger than a moth. About the size of a small rodent, in fact. Yes, it was a mouse. So much for "not a creature was stirring"! The chase was on.

"Leave it!" I said. I always tell my clients not to use "leave it" in a situation where you don't have control of what you are telling your dog to "leave" until you have a pretty solid leave it on cue. And with this exciting of a situation, I probably should not have said it. Romeo is pretty good with stationary objects, but small furry objects running around are a much greater challenge. But I said it, so now I had to follow through. I said it again. I think I said it a third time as well. Amazingly enough, Romeo actually did stop the chase.

By this time, the mouse found his escape route and disappeared. Romeo really did "leave it". I'd like to say it's because of the phenomenal job I've done training him. Of course, it might just have been because he lost track of the mouse or some other reason. Nah, I'm pretty sure it was my excellent training skills. Yep, we'll go with that.


Foster Homes Needed!! ***** Be a Pal, Save a Dal *****
