10 Vet-Reviewed Christmas Holiday Safety Tips for Dogs

- 3. Watch for Frostbite and Hypothermia: Be aware of the signs of frostbite (pale or grey skin, coldness) and hypothermia (shivering, lethargy). If you notice these symptoms, bring your dog indoors immediately.
- 4. Provide Proper Clothing: For short-haired or small breeds, consider getting a dog coat or sweater to help keep them warm during walks. Ensure it covers from the neck to the base of the tail.
- 5. Keep Them Dry: After walks in the snow or rain, dry your dog off to prevent them from getting chilled. Pay special attention to their ears, paws, and belly.
- 6. Stay Hydrated: Ensure your dog has access to fresh water, as they can become dehydrated in winter just as easily as in summer. Snow is not a substitute for water.
- 7. Be Cautious of Antifreeze and De-icing Agents: Antifreeze is highly toxic to dogs. Keep an eye on where your dog is walking and clean up any spills immediately. Wipe their paws after walks to remove any harmful residues.
- 8. Gradual Acclimatization: If your dog is not used to cold weather, gradually increase their outdoor time to help them acclimate.

author's dedication to rescue and adoption. Readers will discover a rich, emotionally layered story that celebrates compassion, second chances, and the true spirit of Christmas.



NATIONAL MUTT DAY - DECEMBER 2, 2025

National Mutt Day encourages us to embrace, save and celebrate mixed breed dogs twice a year on July 31 and December 2. Desperately longing for a new home, millions of loving and healthy mixed breed dogs in shelters wait for someone to come and adopt them. National Mutt Day provides an excellent opportunity to find the perfect canine companion. Despite the name, a mutt learns, obeys and trains much like purebred animals. While their lineage cannot be traced and their features a bit murky, their companionship will be faithful.

According to the ASPCA, approximately 3.3 million dogs enter shelters every year. When these abandoned and often abused animals find their way to a shelter, each one needs a forever home. Whether you know it or not, their potential is limitless. Some of the benefits of adoption are often hidden. Humans and canines both enjoy increased physical activity.

Another boost is social interaction through daily walks. While humans develop patience, their four-legged companion learns to trust and new limits. For example, as dogs explore the many scents of the human lifestyle, they usually discover shoes are off-limits. No matter the breed, size or demeanor of the human, er, canine, the shelter will take the time to find the right home for their animals. They schedule visits and have procedures in place to promote healthy adoptions for families and individuals. While some dogs experience injury or illness, the shelters work with veterinarians to heal the animals before making them available for adoption. Of course, shelters always welcome donations and volunteers. Dogs love walking, playing and being loved even if they haven't found their forever home. Every moment they spend socializing increases their opportunity for adoption.

Mutt FAQ

How many purebred dogs are found in shelters? Purebred numbers in shelters are significantly lower than mix-breed animals. A study by the National Animal Interest Alliance in 2015 found that only 5 percent of the dogs in shelters are purebred.

What are the most common purebred dogs found in shelters? The top two purebred dogs found in shelters are Pit Bulls and Chihuahuas.

Are there more mutts than purebreds in the United States? More than half of the dogs in the United States are mutts. Mars Veterinary conducted the first-ever National Mutt Census in 2010. The data collected revealed breed prominence, which purebreds were the most popular, and how owners care for their dogs. One notable result showed that 53 percent of the dogs in the United States are of mixed breed.

Unfortunately, about 7.6 million companion animals (dogs, cats, and other domestic pets) enter shelters around the country yearly. NATIONAL PET SUFFOCATION AWARENESS WEEK - WEEK AFTER THANKSGIVING

National Pet Suffocation Awareness Week reminds us of the risks food packaging poses to our pets. Each year during the week after Thanksgiving, take time to learn the preventative measures to keep your pets safe.

Most pet owners are unaware of the dangers food packaging poses for their pets. That's why this day is so important. Any type of plastic wrapping or bags poses a danger. Our pets are drawn to the smell and flavor of our food as well as the lure of their snacks and kibble. We all do it. During a commercial, we leave a bag of popcorn on the coffee table. We set the groceries on the counter. The garbage can is also an easy target while we take a shower.

Our pets by nature wait for their opportunity to pounce. And it's dangerous! Regardless of the size or breed of animal, they can suffocate in 3-5 minutes. The average commercial break is 4 minutes. Our average shower is 8 minutes long. Even the closed snack and cereal packaging left on countertops lure our pets while we are not at home.

9 Ways Pet Owners Can Protect Their Furry Companions:

- 1. Store packaged food in high cabinets or in pantries
- 2. Use a locking garbage can or store under the sink
- 3. Gates provide separation from food areas and pet areas during family gatherings
- 4. Store snacks and cereals in plastic containers
- 5. Eat snacks from bowls instead of from the bags
- 6. Cut bags along both sides to prevent an animal from being trapped in the bag
- 7. Become diligent about returning packaged foods to their storage areas
- 8. Learn pet CPR
- 9. While exercising our pets, watch for litter. This includes bags that may have blown into our yards as well.

The week is also an opportunity to share the stories of our pets - those we've lost due to suffocation and those who've been saved thanks to increased awareness. Our pets bring joy to our lives. They improve our health and are a part of our family.

Take time this week to make your home pet safe. Share information with your pet-loving friends and family. Let your veterinarians know of these risks so they can share with their clients, too.





Reader Submitted Dog Cookie Recipes

From the kitchen of Maggie and Sally Sunflower Cookies

INGREDIENTS

2 cups white flour

1/4 cup cornmeal

1/4 cup chopped sunflower

seeds

2 tbsp. Safflower oil

½ cup molasses

2 eggs, mixed with ¼ cup milk

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a large bowl, mix together dry ingredients and seeds.
- 2. In another bowl, mix oil, broth and egg mixture.
- 3. Add oil, molasses and milk mixture to the first bowl.
- 4. Knead in the food processor.
- 5. Roll out to ½" thickness, cut into shapes (using preferred cookie cutter or just round using a small glass).
- 6. Bake on an ungreased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 30 minutes
- 7. Allow to cool.

NOTES:

The food processor makes kneading easier.

Trainer Tips "Helping a new dog adjust to a new home"

Question:

We just brought home our new dog. What is the best way to help her adjust to her new home?

The Trainer Answers:

You might be tempted to forego the household rules when your new dog is first settling in at your home. This is especially true if you know – or believe – your dog to have been through a rough time before coming to live with you. If you feel sorry for the way the dog might have been treated in the past, you might try to "make up for it" by letting the dog do whatever she wants when she first arrives – within reason, of course.

In most cases, this really is not the best thing to do. Just as we do, dogs like predictability, routine and structure. They adapt to new situations better the sooner they can figure out the rules and boundaries for their new living situation. By abandoning the normal rules, you will confuse your dog. For example, you might think your dog will be happier and feel more at home if she is allowed to sleep on the bed with you and snuggle on the couch. However, if your normal household rules are for your dogs to stay off from the furniture, you are not doing her any favors by allowing her on them now and then telling her she can't be on them later. If you have provided a comfortable dog bed, help her understand this is her space to rest from the start.

Your dog will settle in faster if you get her started on a daily routine right away. Nothing helps a dog adapt to their new home better than having a predictable routine. Many people bring home a new dog over a weekend or when they have a few days to spend with the dog before heading back to work all day. This is great, and I highly recommend it! However, this time should be spent preparing your dog for what your normal daily routine will be. If you spend 24 hours a day with her for the first two days and then suddenly disappear for nine hours the next day, it can be a very difficult transition for your dog. Take those first couple of days to acclimate your dog to her crate or other confinement space if she will have one. Begin helping her adapt to your being away for very brief periods before you disappear for several hours.

You might not have as predictable a schedule in your daily life. However, you can still help your dog adapt to a routine. Even if you don't wake up, depart the house, or stay away from home at the same time every day, you can still develop a routine for your dog. For example, you might take your dog for a walk when you first get up, feed her, then spend some quiet time working while she naps before you head out to work or run errands. Even if these things don't happen at the exact same time every day, there is some predictability in what does occur once you get up in the morning.

Some dogs adapt easily to changes in routine. Others you can set your clock by – much to the chagrin of those who would prefer to sleep in on the weekends! I used to be one of those, until my first Greyhound taught me to enjoy sunrise walks before most others were out of bed on the weekends. It was a valuable bonding time we shared that I would have missed out on had I insisted he adapt to my schedule and sleep in. Certainly there were mornings I would have preferred to stay in bed. However, now I look back on those walks as one of my favorite times.

While you might want your dog to adapt to your schedule, sometimes finding a compromise will ultimately work well for both of you. Establish your rules and boundaries from the start so your dog knows what to expect in her new home. However, remain flexible enough to consider changing – not bending temporarily, but actually changing – a rule that might not be that important after all.
